And Scrooge's name was good upon 'Change for anything he chose to put his hand to. Old Marley was as dead as a doornail.' – "A Christmas Carol" by Charles Dickens

'The little town straggling up the hill was bright with coloured Christmas lights. But George Pratt did not see them. He was leaning over the railing of the iron bridge, staring down moodily at the black water. The current eddied and swirled like liquid glass, and occasionally a bit of ice, detached from the shore, would go gliding downstream to be swallowed up in the shadows.' – "The Greatest Gift" by Philip Van Doren Stern

'Mabel had known there would be silence. That was the point, after all. No infants cooing or wailing. No neighbour children playfully hollering down the lane. 	CLUES

2	Maia agrees that this is a good way to be objective in the research, so as to avoid making wrong assumptions.
3	One of the female writers suggests that visiting the festival is the only way to get a thorough knowledge of it.
4	Someone suggests interviewing people online or over the phone who live in the country where the festival takes place and know all about it.
5	Steve recommends watching documentaries and also suggests that getting feedback on the finished manuscript by at least one person from the other country's culture is essential.
6	Maia isn't the person who suggested visiting the festival.

4. CROSSWORD – CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS ACROSS THE WORLD



5. STORY CROSSWORD

Complete the story and fill in the clues about this famous Christmas novella. The shaded squares are an anagram of its name.

This novella was written by Charles (2d) and was first published on 19 December 1843 with illustrations by John Leech. Having experienced poverty as a boy and later visited poor areas, such as (9a) mines in Cornwall, the author had a strong desire to make his readers aware of such hardships and to (11d) bring about social reforms.
The author had already written a few Christmas (14a) and had read essays about older Christmas traditions, along with experiencing the changing Victorian ideas about the festive season, such as the resurgence of interest in carols and the introduction to England of the Christmas Tree.
In 1843 he was having (7d) problems and, with his fifth child born that year, he needed to earn extra money, so he wrote the entire manuscript of this book in six weeks. (12a) with his vibrant characterisation and humour, the (15a) involves a callous, miserly man who is redeemed after being visited by three ghosts. Through them we find out about the (3d) that made Scrooge who he is and the bleak (6d) that awaits him unless he changes. Regretting his behaviour, Scrooge decides that money is less important than showing (1a) and compassion to those with less.
The book has never been out of (10d) and remains (5d) across the world. Various plays and films have been made, based (13d) it, featuring such actors as Alastair (4d), Albert Finney and (8a) Stewart. Its message of charity affected many of its wealthy readers of the time and has remained an important part of the festive season since then.



7. FACT JIGSAW - HANUKKAH

Use the underlined words in the Hanukkah information below to fill in the first grid, according to the number of letters in each word. The number of words in the grid is listed in brackets, i.e. one three-letter word, five six-letter words, etc. Once all the words are added, you can use them to put together the jigsaw.

Hanukkah is a <u>Jewish</u> celebration that is also sometimes called the <u>Festival</u> of Lights or the Festival of <u>Dedication</u>. It lasts for eight days, the date of its beginning being the twenty-fifth day of <u>Kislev</u>, in the Hebrew calendar. Since this date varies, the festival can take place in either November or December.

Hanukkah is dedicated to the re-dedication of the <u>Temple</u> of Jerusalem, referred to in Catholic and Orthodox versions of the Old Testament. The Jewish people had been persecuted by Antiochus, a Hellenistic Greek king, and after a successful revolt against him, their leader celebrated for eight days, with a miracle taking place of sacred <u>oil</u> that should have run out after one day lasting for eight.

In the current-day celebrations a <u>menorah</u> or hanukkiah candle-holder is used and a new <u>candle</u> is lit each night of the holiday. Gifts are exchanged and games played, including a special spinning top called a <u>Dreidel</u>. Hanukkah food is eaten, such as <u>latkes</u> (potato cakes), <u>gelt</u> (chocolate coins) and sufganiyot (doughnuts).



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
